Task A/B/C/D	Item Type	Course Description: Students who have little or no experience on violin, viola, cello, bass, or harp explore high-quality music literature written or transcribed for string orchestra. Study includes the development of foundational instrumental ensemble techniques, performance skills, music literacy, and aesthetic awareness. Public performances may serve as a culmination of specific instructional goals. Students may be required to attend and/or participate in rehearsals and performances outside the school day to support, extend, and assess learning in the classroom. This course may also require students to obtain a musical instrument (e.g., borrow, rent, purchase) from an outside source.

Perform musical work with expression (can include, but not limited to: dynamic contrast, phrasing, articulation, style) and proper technique (to include, but not limited to: tone quality, hand position, bowing, posture, intonation according to ability level), ability level appropriate repertoire (for example: "Ode to Joy" in 4/4 time signature)

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
PHYSICAL ENVIRONMENT EQUIPMENT (e.g., Microphone, Stand): A secure quiet room with chair, music stand, and video camera (must face front of student to see body posture along with left and right hands and left and right arm positions). Students should be in sitting position (except bass - stand or sit).



BENCHMARK(S)	MU.68.S.3.3 - Sight-read standard exercises and simple repertoire.
BENCHMARK CLARIFICATION	Perform unknown music piece with no preparation
ITEM TYPES	On-demand On-demand
CONTENT LIMITS	Classical style piece (i.e., Haydn, Mozart) with more basic characteristics than pieces on the Florida Orchestra Association MPA Level E music list. Using as a reference a standard first year method book that aligns with state adopted materials: Perform musical work with good pitch accuracy, rhythm accuracy, intonation, and tone quality. Ability level should be one level easier than appropriate repertoire level. Students are allowed 30 seconds to preview the music, during which they are allowed to touch their instruments but not allowed to produce a sound.
CONTEXTS (Student's Role)	Perform instrument part solo
DEPTH OF KNOWLEDGE	2
STIMULUS ATTRIBUTES	Student will be provided recorded two-measure count off prior to the thirty-second preview time. Student performs following a recorded two-measure count off. Length: 8 measures Time signatures 4/4 or 3/4 time signature Tempo: Moderate (72-104 bpm) Key Signature: D Range: 1st position fingering (except basses – limit to one octave) Rhythmic values – whole, half and quarter notes and rests No expression, or articulation changes
RESPONSE ATTRIBUTES	Audio response
TIME ALLOTMENT	60-90 seconds (30 seconds preview/approximately 30 seconds perform)
PHYSICAL ENVIRONMENT /EQUIPMENT (e.g., Microphone, Stand):	A secure quiet room with audio recording device, chair, and music stand. Students should be in sitting position (except bassist – stand or sit).
